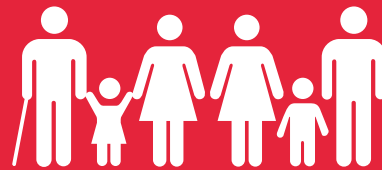

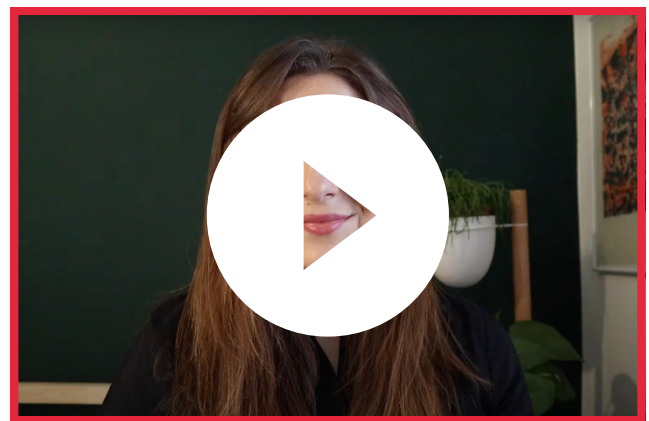

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Did you know?



Since the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) started in 2015, we've made some big progress in cutting extreme poverty around the world. The number of people living in extreme poverty, which means surviving on less than \$1.90 a day, went down from 10% in 2015 to 9.2% in 2019. This shows we're moving in the right direction to reach SDG 1.

The COVID-19 pandemic has been a big problem for SDG 1's goal of wiping out poverty. Because of the pandemic, lots of people have ended up back in extreme poverty. This shows that we really need to do something specific to help those who are most at risk. We need strong plans and strategies to make sure vulnerable groups don't suffer too much because of the pandemic.



SDG 1 looks at poverty in a lot of different ways, not just how much money someone has. It includes things like education, health, having what you need, and being part of society. This way of thinking about poverty helps us understand all the different reasons why it happens and come up with ways to fix it that help everyone.

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Decolonize your eyes

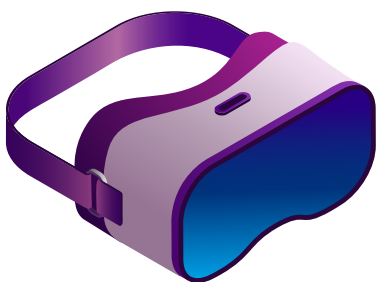
This 360 degrees video wants to change how we think about the favelas (slums) and communities in Rio de Janeiro. It tells the stories of the people who live there to challenge the usual ideas. The main goal is to “decolonize” the way we talk about these places. That means putting the focus on what the residents think and feel. The video shares their experiences, showing their daily lives, struggles, and successes. It aims to break down the negative ideas people might have and give a more detailed and real picture of life in Rio de Janeiro’s favelas.
