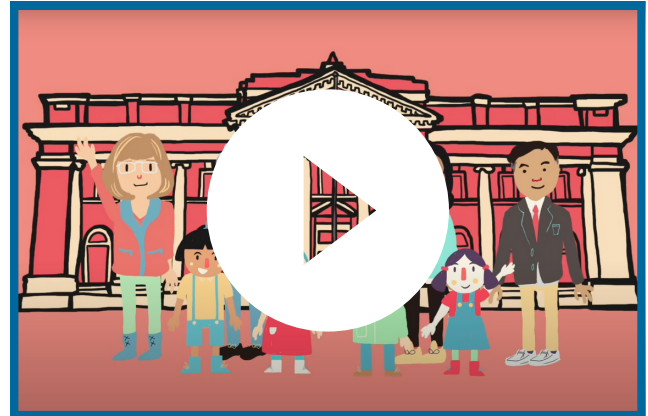

Did you know?



Despite facing challenges, there has been notable progress in reducing global homicide rates. As reported by the United Nations, the global homicide rate decreased from 7.6 per 100,000 population in 2000 to 5.3 in 2016. This decline indicates positive strides toward fulfilling the objectives outlined in SDG 16.

One aspect of SDG 16 is to ensure equal access to justice for all. However, as of 2022, the World Justice Project's Rule of Law Index revealed that over 5 billion people worldwide encounter unmet legal needs. This underscores the ongoing necessity for additional progress in guaranteeing access to justice.



Transparency International's Corruption Perceptions Index sheds light on the global battle against corruption, a crucial aspect of SDG 16. The most recent data reveals that corruption remains a challenge in numerous countries, with varying degrees of progress. While some nations are making headway, others still grapple with significant corruption issues.

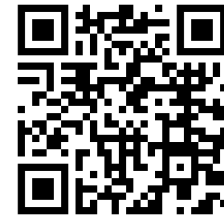


The displaced

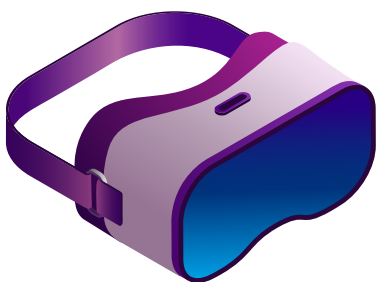
This 360 degrees video wants to change how we think about the favelas (slums) and communities in Rio de Janeiro. It tells the stories of the people who live there to challenge the usual ideas. The main goal is to “decolonize” the way we talk about these places. That means putting the focus on what the residents think and feel. The video shares their experiences, showing their daily lives, struggles, and successes. It aims to break down the negative ideas people might have and give a more detailed and real picture of life in Rio de Janeiro’s favelas.

What you can do
